

**To graduate with a B.A. or B.Sc. degree, you must do three things:**

- 1) Complete the requirements for one of the four Program Types, as described in detail in the University *Calendar* ([www.usask.ca/calendar](http://www.usask.ca/calendar)). The Program Type depends on which major subject or interdisciplinary program you choose - the choices are listed below. For the Bachelor of Arts degree, you will follow Program Type A, B or D. For the Bachelor of Science degree, you will follow Program Type C. The College of Arts and Science also offers programs leading to the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree (in Studio Art or Drama), and to the Bachelor of Music degree.
- 2) Complete the requirements for the major you choose. The major program as described in the University *Calendar* **for the year you entered** is the one you will follow, if you graduate within 10 years of the date you entered University.
- 3) Achieve the Cumulative Percentage Average required for graduation in the degree program you have selected. The graduation standard is described in detail in the University *Calendar* available online at [www.usask.ca/calendar](http://www.usask.ca/calendar).

**HUMANITIES (Program Type A)** Majoring in one of the following subject areas:

**SOCIAL SCIENCES (Program Type B)** Majoring in one of the following subject areas:

Aboriginal Public Administration (APA); Anthropology; Archaeology; Business Economics; Economics; Geography (Human); International Studies (IS); Land Use & Environmental Studies (LUEST); Linguistics; Native Studies; Northern Studies; Political Studies; Prairie Studies; Psychology; Public Administration; Regional & Urban Planning (RUP); Sociology (including the Aboriginal Justice & Criminology Program [ABJAC] for Aboriginal Students and Indigenous Peoples & Justice Programs [IPJP]); Sociology of Biotechnology; Women's & Gender Studies (Sociology, Economics, Native Studies options)

**NATURAL SCIENCES (Program Type C)** Majoring in one of the following subject areas:

Anatomy; Archaeology; Biochemistry; Biochemistry & Biotechnology; Bioinformatics; Biology; Biology & Biotechnology; Biomolecular Structure Studies; Cell Biology & Biotechnology; Chemistry; Computer Science; Computing; Environmental Earth Sciences (EES); Food Science; Geography (Physical); Geology; Geophysics; Land Use & Environmental Studies (LUEST); Mathematics; Mathematical Physics; Microbiology; Microbiology & Biotechnology; Palaeobiology; Physics; Physiology; Statistics; Toxicology

**FINE ARTS (Program Type D)** Majoring in one of the following subject areas:

Art (Art History and Studio Art); Drama; Music; Women's & Gender Studies (Art option)

**Minors**

In conjunction with a different major, students may complete a minor in: Anthropology; Archaeology; Astronomy; Biology; Chemistry; Classical, Medieval and Renaissance Studies (CMRS); Classics; Computer Science; Crime, Law and Justice Studies; Economics; Entrepreneurship; French; Geographic Information Systems; Geography (Human or Physical); Geology; German; History; Indigenous Peoples and Justice Program; Mathematics; Native Studies; Northern Studies; Philosophy; Philosophy, Science & Biotechnology; Philosophy, Science & Technology; Physics; Political Studies; Religious Studies; Russian; Spanish; Statistics; Urban Planning; Women's & Gender Studies

**Recognition**

Students may fulfil the requirements to receive Recognition in: French; German; Russian; Spanish, or Ukrainian.

**Other Courses**

Courses are also offered in other subjects; e.g. Astronomy, Chinese, Greek, Hebrew, Latin, Literature and Pharmacology, though not in sufficient numbers to make up a major. These courses may not be offered every year. Students may take approved courses from other colleges for credit towards and Arts & Science degree.
